

HONORING THE PAST EMPOWERING THE FUTURE

CELEBRATING & SUSTAINING VIRGIN ISLANDS CULTURE

In November 2024, the Community Foundation of the Virgin Islands (CFVI) was officially designated as the Humanities Council of the Virgin Islands – recognizing CFVI's leadership in preserving and promoting culture, history, and the humanities throughout the territory.

The National Endowment of the Humanities (NEH) is an independent federal agency and one of the largest funders of humanities programs in the United States. It supports research, education, preservation, and public programs that deepen understanding of the human experience. As the official humanities council for the territory, CFVI now serves as the primary local partner in advancing these efforts in the USVI.

Since beginning its partnership with NEH in 2020, CFVI has awarded over \$1.5 million to support projects focused on education, cultural preservation, and storytelling. In 2024 alone, \$232,000 in new grants were distributed to organizations across the Virgin Islands.

EMPOWERING FUTURE LEADERS: RASHIDA HODGE'S TRANSFORMATIVE GIFT TO USVI STUDENTS

For Rashida A. Hodge, giving back is a calling. A proud St. Thomas native, tech executive, and NC State alumna, Hodge is creating lasting impact through the \$1 million Rashida A. Hodge Scholarship Fund at CFVI.

The scholarship covers full tuition, housing, and fees for students from USVI public schools attending NC State University. It's a life-changing opportunity for students to pursue their dreams without financial barriers.

Hodge's journey – from Charlotte Amalie High School to Corporate Vice President at Microsoft – has been shaped by education, perseverance, and a deep connection to her roots. She established the scholarship in honor of her grandmother, Ioline Hodge, whose legacy of giving inspired her own. "My success is her success," she says.

Beyond financial support, Hodge mentors young professionals and serves on NC State's Board of Visitors. In December, she delivered the university's fall commencement address, continuing her mission to inspire and uplift.

Hodge sums it up best: "Giving will forever be my positive disruption of choice." Through her generosity, the next generation of Virgin Islanders will thrive – and lead.

A LEGACY OF GIVING: THE ANDERSON STEWART FAMILY FOUNDATION

In 2024, with immense gratitude the Community Foundation of the Virgin Islands (CFVI) celebrates a substantial gift of \$1 million from the Anderson Stewart Family, solidifying the Family's deep commitment to the Virgin Islands' long-term well-being. This significant donation establishes a donor-advised fund at CFVI, creating a lasting source of support for nonprofit initiatives across the Territory. Annual grant distributions will be planned to provide sustainable impact for generations to come.

For decades, the Anderson Stewart Family has provided critical charitable support to our Virgin Islands with an unending legacy of giving, touching the lives of so many, in very many ways! With a deep commitment to education, the Andersons pioneered the USVI Teacher Grant Program through their field of interest fund at CFVI providing more than 400 grants to teachers throughout the Territory.

In the aftermath of the devasting hurricanes, Irma and Maria, the family along with their local subsidiaries provided \$5 million to nonprofits across the territory, playing a vital role in the rebuilding efforts to what destroyed so much of what we cherish. The philanthropic reach of the Anderson Stewart family provided essential expertise as well: UCLA's Anderson School of Management dispatched a team of experts to St. Thomas to assist in the rebuild efforts. And again, during the pandemic, along with their local leadership philanthropic support was unwavering.

We at CFVI are deeply appreciative for the many ways that the Andersen Stewart Family has stepped forward to support the islands and we are grateful that the Anderson Family's strong ties to our community will endure. This new partnership with CFVI reflects their strategic and heartfelt investment in the future of the Virgin Islands.

SCHOLARSHIPS

CFVI AWARDS \$193,300 IN SCHOLARSHIPS TO 65 VIRGIN ISLANDS STUDENTS

For nearly three decades, CFVI has been dedicated to fostering educational opportunities for the territory's students. In 2024, CFVI awarded \$193,300 in scholarships to 65 Virgin Islands students, continuing its commitment to empowering the next generation.

CFVI awarded two \$5,000 scholarships from The Lawyers' Scholarship Fund, established in 2022 by Lisa Harris Moorhead, a current attorney on St. Croix, and Susan Bastress, a former St. Croix attorney, to support Virgin Islands students pursuing law degrees.

The 2024 recipients are Amisha Mirchandani, a graduate of Antilles School attending Villanova University School of Law, and Layalie Washshah, a Good Hope Country Day School alum attending Loyola University Chicago School of Law.

A SCHOLAR'S STORY: TAYSJAH HEIDMANN



For Taysjah Heidmann, a recipient of the \$5,000 Lana Vento Scholarship, the award is more than just financial assistance – it's a lifeline. A senior nursing student at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Heidmann's passion for healthcare was ignited by personal experiences.

"Growing up, my mother battled chronic illnesses, and I saw firsthand how compassionate care could make a difference," she shared. "That's what inspired me to pursue nursing."

Faced with financial challenges throughout her academic journey, Heidmann relied on scholarships to continue her education. "Without support from CFVI and its donors, I don't know if I could have achieved my dream," she said. "This scholarship has changed my life."

THE IMPACT OF GIVING

Since its inception in 1996, CFVI has awarded more than \$4 million in scholarships to deserving students. These funds are made possible by families, businesses, and organizations that recognize the transformative power of education.

CFVI President Dee Baecher-Brown emphasized the far-reaching effects of donor contributions. "Every scholarship represents more than just financial aid – it's an investment in the future of the Virgin Islands," she said. 

VIRGIN ISLANDS CHILDREN'S MUSEUM



INSPIRING DISCOVERY ACROSS THE TERRITORY

The Virgin Islands Children's Museum (VICM), located at Buccaneer Mall on St. Thomas, serves as a dynamic hub for interactive, play-based learning that reaches children and families across the entire U.S. Virgin Islands. With thoughtfully designed exhibits focused on science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM), the museum provides opportunities for hands-on exploration that foster creativity, critical thinking, and a lifelong love of learning.

As a territory-wide resource, VICM regularly welcomes students, families, and community groups from St. Thomas, St. John, and St. Croix – ensuring equitable access to high-quality informal education. The museum also leads the local implementation of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, providing free, age-appropriate books each month to children from birth to age five throughout the territory. This initiative supports early literacy and helps establish the foundation for academic success.

Through its exhibits, programs, and literacy outreach, VICM exemplifies the power of community-driven education and continues to be a vital partner in CFVI's mission to create a brighter future for all Virgin Islanders.

CARIBBEAN MUSEUM CENTER FOR THE ARTS




CELEBRATING CULTURE & CREATIVITY

Located in the heart of Frederiksted, St. Croix, the Caribbean Museum Center for the Arts (CMCArts) is a cornerstone of cultural enrichment in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Dedicated to nurturing and showcasing the vibrant artistic heritage of the Caribbean, CMCArts offers a wide range of programs, exhibitions, and educational opportunities that engage artists, students, and visitors of all ages.

Through visual arts, performance, and community events, the museum fosters creativity, cultural pride, and cross-generational learning. Its youth programs provide hands-on art instruction and mentorship, empowering young people to explore their talents and express themselves in meaningful ways. CMCArts also serves as a vital gathering space for local and regional artists, supporting professional development and creative exchange.

As a longtime CFVI grantee and partner, CMCArts continues to inspire, educate, and connect communities across the Virgin Islands – celebrating the power of art to transform lives and preserve cultural identity.

PRESERVING CULTURE THROUGH LITERATURE

CFVI's Center for the Book Showcases USVI Stories on a National Stage



As the official Library of Congress Center for the Book, CFVI champions Virgin Islands voices. In 2024, we showcased authors C.M. Rohan ("Ziggy on the Rock") and Cadwell Turnbull ("The Lesson") at the National Book Festival, celebrating their stories and cultural significance on a national stage. Their works, selected through a community process, demonstrate the vibrant literary talent of the USVI.

SPREADING THE JOY OF READING WITH LITTLE FREE LIBRARIES

CFVI continues to expand its Little Free Library (LFL) program, bringing free books to neighborhoods across the territory. In 2024, two new libraries opened, one at Joseph Aubain Ballpark in Frenchtown and another at the Maternal and Child Health Clinic near Nisky Center – bringing the total to 15 LFLs serving the USVI.

Launched in 2019, CFVI's LFL program is part of a global "take a book, share a book" movement. Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization founded in 2009 that promotes literacy and community connection through small, publicly accessible book-sharing boxes. These libraries foster a love of reading by providing free access to books in neighborhoods, schools, parks, and other community spaces. With over 150,000 registered libraries worldwide, it is one of the largest book-sharing networks globally.

As the U.S. Virgin Islands Center for the Book, CFVI supports literacy and community building through this local initiative. Each library offers more than books – it's a community hub. The Joseph Aubain Ballpark library was sponsored by Kentucky Highway Industries during their St. Thomas convention, while the clinic library includes parenting resources and bilingual children's books, supporting families who visit the health center.

Since 2019, CFVI has distributed over 21,700 books and invested nearly \$100,000 in building, stocking, and maintaining these libraries. The Foundation also refurbishes and restocks existing locations regularly.



DRIVING COMMUNITY IMPACT THROUGH CORPORATE PARTNERSHIPS

In 2024, CFVI awarded over \$1.1 million in grants, powered by strategic collaborations with Popular, Inc. and Heavy Materials. These partnerships are advancing youth education, economic opportunity, and nonprofit support across the territory.

POPULAR VI COMMUNITY FUND

SUPPORTING YOUTH & THE ENVIRONMENT

Launched in 2022, the Popular VI Community Fund – sustained by employee donations from Popular in the U.S. and British Virgin Islands–distributed \$100,000 in grants to 10 nonprofits. Grantees included DJ's Training Facility, Friends of Virgin Islands National Park, and My Brother's Workshop, supporting programs in youth development, vocational training, and sustainability.

HEAVY MATERIALS

OVER \$1 MILLION INVESTED IN COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

Heavy Materials donated \$1,030,719 to CFVI to support 22 nonprofit initiatives in healthcare, education, the arts, and youth services. Beneficiaries included the Children's Museum of St. Croix, Family Resource Center, Lutheran Social Services, and Schneider Regional Medical Center. CFVI also received funding for its Rapid Response Program, scholarships, and the Virgin Islands Center for the Book.

A MODEL FOR CORPORATE GIVING

These collaborations showcase how businesses can amplify their impact by working with CFVI's expert grant management. Popular and Heavy Materials are setting a high standard for corporate citizenship in the Virgin Islands.





VIRTUAL GIVING TREE SPREADS HOLIDAY CHEER ACROSS THE VIRGIN ISLANDS

In 2024, CFVI's Virtual Giving Tree Project brought holiday joy to children, youth, families, and seniors by distributing \$62,720 to 30 nonprofit organizations across the U.S. Virgin Islands. Now in its fifth year, the initiative has provided over \$350,000 in holiday-related support since its launch during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

What began as a simple act of kindness has grown into a cherished annual tradition. CFVI connects donors with nonprofits by sharing specific holiday funding requests through email, social media, and direct outreach. Once matched, donations are quickly distributed to help meet urgent seasonal needs.

From toys and meals to essential supplies and program support, the Virtual Giving Tree continues to make a meaningful difference for many across the territory.

CFVI thanks all who contributed to the 2024 effort and invites others to join in supporting local nonprofits during the holidays and throughout the year.


