# **CFVI Offering Grants for 2021 USVI Humanities Projects**

**APPLICATION DEADLINE: April 30, 2021** 

**U.S. Virgin Islands, April 20, 2021** — The Community Foundation of the Virgin Islands (CFVI) was awarded National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) funding to support humanities education, lifelong learning and public humanities programming in the territory.
